



Early Childhood Evaluation Hub: Early Insights

A synthesis of evidence building in 2023

Stimulus Funding. The Colorado Department of Early Childhood (CDEC) administered over \$700 million in federal and state stimulus funding between 2021 and 2022 to address pandemic recovery needs and strengthen Colorado’s early childhood sector.

Evidence-Building. The Colorado Evaluation and Action Lab serves as the [Early Childhood Stimulus Evaluation Hub](#), coordinating and overseeing high-quality evaluations of nearly 20 of the over 40 stimulus-funded strategies. Research teams are conducting the evaluations with the Hub synthesizing and aligning findings to activate learnings for policy and program improvements.

Early Insights. The initial phases of the evaluation work can be used to help inform:


-  CDEC stimulus program leads and funding recipients on course corrections and continuous improvements as they implement stimulus-funded activities.
-  Legislators and policymakers on funding and policy decisions to continue or advance critical strategies post-stimulus funding.

This synthesis of early insights is based on [evidence briefs](#) developed by the Hub evaluation teams. Interim findings will be shared in spring 2024 and final findings will be shared in fall 2024.

Top-Line Early Insights

Funding Strategy and Context

Colorado is effectively distributing stimulus funds across the state, though the compressed state funding timeline and dispersed nature of funding, in an already-complex early childhood landscape, made it challenging for providers to achieve objectives.



Funding Environment. Colorado secured stimulus funding to address pandemic recovery and strengthen the early childhood sector at the same time the new CDEC launched.

- 💡 Stimulus funding was implemented in the context of several ongoing early childhood initiatives (Universal Preschool, CCCAP, PDG), and demand for services is only increasing as stimulus funding comes to a close.
- 💡 Colorado had been losing child care capacity prior to the pandemic, which only exacerbated existing challenges such as workforce shortages and insufficient availability of child care slots.

Funding Approach. 2,300+ child care providers, families, and others provided input to inform funding priorities, resulting in more targeted uses of stimulus funds than in other states.

- 💡 Required approval of stimulus strategies by the state legislature truncated the time available to implement activities and deterred some providers from accepting the funding at all.
- 💡 Alternative funding models that are less restrictive and direct to communities could better support equity in funding distribution, especially for smaller entities and in rural areas.
- 💡 Leveraging existing data infrastructure to centrally track the distribution of funds was challenging due, in part, to limited access to timely information on reach and equity in funding distribution.

Funding Partnerships. Public-private partnerships to administer funding and programs were critical to the success of stimulus strategies.

- 💡 Partners accelerated funding distribution, connected with communities, promoted equity, responded to emerging needs, and increased the ability to reach new providers and partners.
- 💡 Early Childhood Councils played a critical role in outreach, application, and implementation support, often with limited capacity and overhead.



Access & Quality

Children thrive when all families have equal access to a comprehensive system of early childhood services.

Quality

Improve quality of programs and services.

Home provider network. A pilot is supporting home providers with technical assistance, licensing kits, and business training.

 Maintain a spectrum of support for FCCH providers from intensive to light touch.

Sustainability

Sustain early childhood programs and services; improve financial viability.

Financial viability. New CCCAP policies increase provider reimbursement rates and provide pay based on enrollment, helping providers close revenue gaps and maintain continuity of care.

 New CCCAP policies position Colorado to meet proposed federal rules that aim to strengthen financial stability.

 Implementation of CCCAP policies varies by county; administrators are not leveraging policies to recruit providers, focusing instead on retention.

Preparation

Provide diverse pathways to bring knowledgeable workforce into the field.

Qualification opportunities. Stipends, scholarships, and apprenticeships provide diverse career pathways to gain early childhood knowledge and enter the field.

 The variation in implementation of credential/qualification pathways influences program quality and recruitment of applicants.

 More opportunities in Spanish and other languages are needed to increase diverse applicants.

 More intensive outreach and engagement efforts are needed to reach and support those new to the field.

Retention

Improve wages; provide a supportive work environment.

Teacher support. A pilot is boosting teacher salaries, and various supports for well-being are targeting teacher retention.
